1971 ALADDIN TEMPLE SHRINE CIRCUS Musical Program

The 21st Annual Aladdin Temple Shrine Circus took place in Columbus, Ohio in April 1971 in the State Fairgrounds Coliseum. As he had done in previous years, Robert P. Hills, Jr. (WJU #71, WJU Hall of Fame 2013) arranged to record the performance. (Bob's recordings of the 1968, 1969, and 1970 Aladdin Shrine Circus performances were described in previous issues of *Circus Fanfare*.)

Bob later sent me a quarter-inch reel-to-reel tape with an edited version of the 1971 performance. At the time, I was on active duty in the Navy, so this tape ended up being put into storage where it remained overlooked and unplayed for almost 50 years.

Just recently, I came across Bob's 1971 tape while searching for something else. Much to my delight, it was still playable, allowing me to prepare a list of the music that was performed that year.

As was the case with many indoor winter circuses sponsored by fraternal groups, the 1971 Aladdin Temple Shrine Circus' program was a collection of independent acts that had been

booked for the two weeks or so of the engagement. While major acts such as Victor Julian had their own special music, many did not, and it was up to the bandleader to come up with something appropriate for them.

In 1971, the Aladdin Temple Shrine Circus band was led by veteran bandleader

Izzy Cervone who, although in his early '80s, was still coming up with first-rate musical programs that featured everything from works by Karl L. King, Fred Jewell and Russell Alexander, to the latest pop songs.

Here is a listing of the music that was performed for the 1971 Aladdin Temple Shrine Circus and which is contained on Bob Hill's tape. Unfortunately, I do not have a copy of that year's souvenir program and am not able to identify all of the acts that appeared that year.

For those too young to remember it, Victor Julian's act consisted of small dogs wearing different costumes and hopping on their hind

legs down a runway, accompanied by music appropriate to the costumes. Although rather prosaic compared to the Stephenson Family's dog act on Ringling-Barnum, Julian's act remained a crowd pleaser for as long as he presented it. (The little dog wearing the Batman costume always got the biggest response from the audience!)



The manuscript arrangement of Rachmaninoff's Prelude in G Minor dated back to Cervone's years as the Ringling-Barnum Circus'



musical director. In 1959, he used it as the "climb up" music for high wire daredevil Harold Alzana.

1971 was to be Izzy Cervone's last appearance as the Aladdin Temple Shrine Circus' bandleader. He passed away the following year at the age of 82, leaving behind a musical legacy which few circus musicians have ever achieved. The musical programs used for Aladdin Temple Shrine Circus performances after 1972 were never quite as good as the ones that Cervone had come up with.
